59th Annual Bullseye Nationals Regatta, Sandy Bay Yacht Club, Rockport, MA

The 58th Bullseye Nationals at Sandy Bay Yacht Club in Rockport Massachusetts was held with a variety of weather and wind conditions. On Saturday the wind was light and disappeared entirely

for an hour or so after the first race. The RC was able to eventually get in three races. Boats were often very close together, making the racing exciting in slow motion. Joan and Ed Tiffany (BYC) built up a substantial lead with two firsts and a second, while Phil and Cheryl Nutting (SBYC) were firmly in second place.

Sunday morning was a bit different with strong, gusty SW winds and a rainstorm in the midst of race 4, so racers had to use a different set of skills. The best story was about Ed Tiffany, who went swimming between race 4 and race 5 to clear a line from between the rudder and hull yet managed to get back to the starting line. That's real problem solving on the water!

The Tiffanys and Nuttings held on to 1st and 2nd places respectively; Peter Drinkwater and Kyle Stearns (WHYC) were third, Conrad Lavigne and Suzanne Gosselin (SBYC) were fourth, and Ken Jennings and Randy Johnson (NH) were fifth. Full results are on the website.

In addition to the perpetual trophies below, the Herreshoff Museum endowed a special trophy in honor of David C Burnham for the top sailor over 75. The Fishers Island Masters Trophy was won by Conrad Lavigne.

Here are comments from two visitors:

The team at the Sandy Bay Yacht Club did a great job organizing the event and were so warm and welcoming to us visiting sailors. Uncle Gabe and Cousin Jake (Stern) and I were fortunate to sail in a tip-top loaner boat--Deja Bu--with a freshly washed bottom. Although we didn't do her full justice, we loved the competition, camaraderie, and continuity of tradition that the regatta represents. Especially after not having Nationals the last two years, it was so wonderful to get back. I love the commemoration of Dave Burnham, and we're hoping to follow his example and win the "most improved" trophy every other year or so! Uncle Gabe and I have been sailing in the Nationals since I bought my Bullseye ADE back in 2011, and despite the long drive, I love coming back every year from Michigan, seeing old friends, and sailing with family. We're looking forward to Fisher's Island next year."

Fishers Island Yacht Club – Bullseye Fleet Racing Report for Summer 2021

The Bullseye fleet returned to racing after the 2020 hiatus with great enthusiasm. Thirteen different skippers participated over the course of the summer and there were typically 7-10 boats on the line with all four of our club-owned boats competing on at least one Saturday.

Our biggest challenge was the wind. On the first race day, July 10, we waited for the afternoon breeze to fill in, but it never showed. Fortunately, there was wind on the next three Saturdays, so we were able to string together six races for our Saturday series. In August, we had one race day followed by our annual Picnic Race (the wind died during the picnic, so there was no afternoon race) and then the following week we canceled the races and instead prepared for the arrival of Hurricane Henri. Our final Saturday was very windy, and we raced without spinnakers.

The season started with the annual Independence Day Trophy Race and concluded with the Labor Day Trophy Race. These races use government marks for buoys and give us a chance to sail a longer race outside of our typical racing area.

Kudos to all of the winners including season champions Meris Enright (1st); David C. Burnham (2nd); and Tom duPont (3rd).

Ask Wendy

Dear Wendy,

Thank you for hurrying the parts out the door which I have installed and used for a week now. This is just a quick note to report back on how well the new club jib works (which you already know) on our 1963 Bullseye. The design, with the club attached perpendicular to the headstay above the second fitting on the jib luff and almost bisecting the sail edges at the clew, the curvature of the club, and the jib sheets pulling straight down to the fairleads produces excellent sail shape. I was quite shocked. Doing some hunting on Google shows that this is not all that common with self-tacking jibs. Two other advantages are excellent as well: the jib sheet can be adjusted from either side of the boat and you have a stiff foot for going wing on wing. With the hook on the boom pushing the clew out, the load on the jibsheet is noticeably reduced over just having a sheet do the work. The sheets now only have to adjust the sail angle and don't have to hold the sail out. I also appreciate the numerous holes in the fitting so I could fine tune the sail curvature to my jib. I started with one of the middle holes and the jib was way too flat. I ended up with last hole and the jib curves like the boom itself on either tack. In this setting all four tell-tales on the jib luff have laminar flow. This is much harder to get right with only a sheet on the clew. So was the club jib your family's design? Or was it a Sidney Herreshoff design? The older wooden 12 1/2's all seem to have a regular boom on the jib. One just has to appreciate the thinking, experience, and trial and error that went into the design.

The Bull's Eye jib boom is something Nat Herreshoff designed when the Fishers Island group asked him for an improved Herreshoff H-12 ½. Instead of the straight jib boom, he designed the curved boom that connects to the forestay. I'm glad you are thrilled with the sail shape as it is faster than the H-12's straight self-tacking jib for sure! Neither Sidney nor my Grandfather could claim the design as it was pure Nat Herreshoff. See attached evolution, the center boat shown is the wooden Herreshoff Bull's Eye built by Herreshoff MFG for the Fishers Island fleet & the boat to it's right is the fiberglass Bull's Eye. Also attached is the blue-print close up of the jib boom itself. Thank you for the feedback as it's nice to simply appreciate the design!

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Meeting Minutes

Bullseye Class Association Annual Meeting 4/25/21 Minutes

This meeting was conducted on Zoom at 4:00 P.M.

Present: Windsor Coffin, Kristen Bock, John Brim, David H. Burnham, Dan Butler, Jean and John Childs, Kathryn and Chris Collings, Doug Doben, Peter Drinkwater, Tom DuPont, Bob Fay, Wendy Goodwin, Laura Hallowell, Cindy Harper, Niko Kotsatos, Conrad and Jo-Ann Lavigne, Kym Lee, George Lucas; Cheryl and Phil Nutting, Pam and Bob Prichard, Fran Reardon, Joan and Ed Tiffany, and Chris Verni; Gordon Goodwin joined the meeting about 4:30p.m.

President Coffin called the meeting to order at 4:05 p.m. Secretary Hallowell reported that we have 94 memberships and 122 members (28 family memberships). This is an increase of about 18. Many members are not in racing clubs. We should try to provide better support for these members.

The minutes of the Annual meeting on 5/3/20 and the Executive Committee minutes of 1/25/21 were approved.

Treasurer Burnham reported that our funds have increased to \$15,571.33, largely because we have not had the expenses of the Nationals for two years. Funds may be available for some special projects. Better support could be given to new members on rigging and caring for their boats. Hallowell mentioned that she often sends photos of the rigging on her boat to new members, but realizes that there are many, many variations. Perhaps we could create a "library" of ways boats are rigged. Members should send photos to Niko who will coordinate with Wendy.

The treasurer's report was approved. It was suggested that Burnham look into Directors and Officers Insurance.

President Coffin remarked on his almost three-year extended tenure as President, admitting that he was ready to have more free time. He has dealt with many challenges in those three years, including the effects of Covid 19 on the Nationals and on racing in individual clubs. He thanked both Fishers Island YC and Sandy Bay YC for working out a way to hold the Nationals this year, and thanked Wendy Goodwin for her offer to host them if all else fails. He also thanked many of the Executive Committee members who have helped the BSA and Laura Hallowell for all the ways she works to keep things running.

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Chris Collings spoke for the Technical Committee; he asked that members keep bringing their questions to his committee.

Reporting for the Competition Committee, Kathryn Collings said they will be considering changes in the Regatta Rules that would be presented for approval next year. Coffin remarked on how very helpful her work had been to Winter Harbor YC in running the Nationals.

George Lucas presented the slate of officers:

President, Peter Drinkwater; Vice-President, Chris Verni; Treasurer, David H. Burnham; Secretary, Laura Hallowell. There were no nominations from the floor. The slate was approved unanimously.

Hallowell reported that planning for the Nationals at SBYC is well under way, and the NOR and registration materials were sent out in early April. SBYC is waiting for the results of the Special Meeting to finalize the maximum number of races sailed. Loaner boats are available, and SBYC hope to be able to accommodate some sailors in private homes. There will be no single-handed racing on Friday; it would have added an additional layer of complication to an already complex situation. Fishers Island YC is enthusiastically looking forward to hosting next year. FIYC expects to have 2-3 loaner boats.

Chris Collings reported that the Marion Recreation Community Sailing program with Bullseyes is restarting after not sailing last year. The Harbor Master is very enthusiastic and wants to host an event, including loaner boats and a cook-out. There were questions such as could there be different levels of expertise and could there be short courses for new racers.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:09 p.m.

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
